Core Cultural Concepts

Sacred

This means that everyone and everything has a reason for being, is worthy of respect and caring, and has a place in the grand scheme of life.

Ritual

Rituals are a way of carrying out a ceremony or event that preserve knowledge, beliefs, and traditions.

Land Stewardship

Land stewardship means drawing on the knowledge of Indigenous peoples and simultaneously safeguarding their rights.

Tradition

Traditional Indigenous knowledge is a network of knowledge, beliefs, and rituals intended to preserve, communicate, and contextualize Indigenous relationships with culture and the land over time.

Interconnectedness

This mindset reflects people who are aware that everything in the universe is connected.

Sovereignty

Indigenous peoples' right to self-govern and sustain and renew their nations and cultures. Sovereignty is not a "gift" to Indigenous peoples, but is inherent.







WHAT ARE THE EFFECTS OF INVISIBILITY?



78% OF AMERICANS POLLED KNOW LITTLE TO NOTHING ABOUT NATIVE AMERICANS

AND A SIGNIFICANT PORTION BELIEVE THATNATIVE PEOPLES MUST BE A DWINDLING POPULATION BECAUSE THEY DO NOT SEE, HEAR, OR READ ABOUT NATIVE PEOPLES

- Invisibility of Native people fuels bias and racism in schools, the media, the courts, and Congress
- Keeps Native communities from having a seat at the table
- Dehumanizes Native peoples

Americans hold negative and romanticized stereotypes simultaneously.



INVISIBILITY AND STEREOTYPES NEGATIVELY IMPACTS LEGISLATIVE AND JUDICIAL DECISIONS



 Most federal judges don't understand sovereignty, have never taken an Indian law course, yet routinely make major decisions affecting tribal nations and citizens.

One American Indian law clerk said a law professor at a Top 10 law school said, "tribes often call themselves 'nations' to puff themselves up."

Policymakers and leaders described tribal governments as having a "poverty mentality," where they fail to plan ahead and are reactive versus proactive.

Congresspersons agree that invisibility, stereotypes, and deficit narratives affect policy.

A significant number of Congresspeople don't have Tribes in their districts and see Native peoples as "somebody else's problem."





Cultural Identity

- Racial and ethnic
- Rooted in Indigenous worldview
 - matrilineal, communal, inborn roles
- Impacted by enduring colonization
 - patriarchy, extraction, capitalism
- Key Concept: Settler Colonialism

Settler Colonialism & Manifest Destiny

Settler Colonialism

Is an enduring structure, not an historic event, whose endgame is always the elimination of the Natives in order to acquire their land, which it does in countless seen and unseen ways.

Manifest Destiny

Refers to the US's divinely sanctioned inevitability-is foundational and always operating unnoticeably in the background. In this worldview, genocide and land dispossession are continually both justified and denied.

Key Characteristics:

- Destroys to replace
- Elimination is the goal
- Woven throughout all levels of society
- Institutionalized by policy

Settler Privilege & Doctrine of Discovery

Settler Privilege Refers to the privilege of living on lands that were taken in the name of democracy through profound violence and injustice.

Settler fragility is the inability to talk about unearned benefits from foreign invasion, dispossession of Indigenous lands, and genocide, based on (white) European religious and cultural supremacy

Doctrine of Discovery

Established a spiritual, political, and legal justification for colonization and seizure of land not inhabited by Christians- the principle of discovery gave European nations an absolute right to "New World lands"

Key Characteristics:

- Systemic and structural
- Based on white supremacy
- Foundational to our legal system
- Normalized by American values

Political Identity

- Tribal Sovereignty
- Recognition (Federal & State)
- Citizenship & Enrollment
- Voting & Political Representation (in US system)
- Key Concept: Blood Quantum

Tribal Sovereignty & Recognition

Tribal Sovereignty

Tribal sovereignty includes the right to govern one's community, the ability to preserve one's culture, and the right to control one's own economy. Native American sovereignty predates the sovereignty of the United States.

Federal Recognition

Federally recognized tribes have a trust relationship with the government. This means that the federal authorities will protect their sovereign status, their lands and tribal property, and their rights as members of domestic dependent nations.

Key Characteristics:

- Rooted in historic treaty policy
- Impacted by nation-state relationships
- Representational data defines tribal rights today- land and funding

Blood Quantum & Tribal Citizenship

Blood Quantum

Is the amount of
"Indian blood" that an
individual possesses. It
is a fraction of blood
that changes
generationally and is
based on the identity of
original enrollees of a
tribe (census data).

Tribal Enrollment

Tribal enrollment requirements preserve the unique character and traditions of each tribe. The tribes establish membership criteria based on shared customs, traditions, language and tribal blood. often based on patrilineal decadency.

Key Characteristics:

- Reductive in nature- aims for elimination
- Citizenship and cultural identity are mutually dependent
- Individuals must choose who to enroll with (one tribal identity)

Geographic Identity

- Land-based
- Ancestral Belonging & Acknowledgment
- Treaty Rights & Stewardship
- Key Concept: Reservations

Treaty Rights & Reservations

Treaty Rights

The act of treating is a nation-to-nation form of intergovernmental interaction. They did not and do not absorb the tribes into the United States- the reverse is true. Treaties recognize and preserve tribal sovereignty in perpetuity.

Reservations

In return for giving up almost all the land, the U.S. made promises to the tribes- to respect their rights over reserved land, and to recognize that those lands would be governed by tribes, not by the state governments.

Key Characteristics:

- Nation-nation in structure
- Rooted in mutual agreement
- These rights were "paid for" by our ancestors- are payments on outstanding debts owed, not special benefits

Ancestry & Land Acknowledgement

Ancestral Belonging

Despite ongoing genocide (1738), removal (1830), relocation (1953), and termination (1964) of native peoples, our sense of belonging is Land-based.

Land Acknowledgment

It is important to understand the longstanding history that has brought you to reside on the land, and to seek to understand your place within that history. Land acknowledgements do not exist in a past tense, or historical context: colonialism is a current ongoing process, and we need to build our mindfulness of our present participation

Key Characteristics:

- We are always on on native land.
- We all have a responsibility to be stewards for future generations.
- Land is part of who we are. It's a mixture of our blood, our past, our current, and our future.
